- 4) Review and approval of June 12, 2023, Legal Action Report and Meeting Minutes Member Hendel moved to approve the Legal Action Report & Minutes. Member Ramirez duly seconded the motion. The motion passed on a roll call vote of 4-0.

- 7) **7. Drought Plan: Implementation Update** Candice Rupprecht, Tucson Water, Superintendent, shared the Mayor & Council Memorandum from the September 6, 2023 study session. The items reviewed and discussed were:
 - a) Study Session M&C September 6
 - b) Improved 57 irrigation and drinking fountains at neighborhood parks using approx. \$1.6 million conservation funds
 - c) Water Audits of City facilities in 2021 implementing 46 of the 104 efficiency recommendations, saving 14MG a year
 - d) Residential customers received high usage letters on average 250% or more in the 2022 calendar year. The expectation is to send additional letters in 2024 based on 2023 consumption. The utility is working to avoid sending duplicate letters.
 - e) Encouraging the use of self-help tools: Home Waterworks Calculator and website
 - f) Recommending Water Audits for high water users and limited-income customers
 - g) Conservation Kits
 - h) Commercial Water Use Guidelines: new billing system data integration
